The Hoover Fire Department is proud to announce we retained our ISO Public Protection Class I rating in December 2022. This rating is the best rating that a fire department can achieve and offers the best insurance savings for our taxpayers. The Hoover Fire Department is one of 45,000 fire departments evaluated by ISO in the United States and of these agencies, only 411 departments have achieved a Class I rating. We are very thankful for the tremendous support we receive from Mayor Brocato, City Administrator Allan Rice and our City Council Members. The dedication, Integrity and duty of our members are the qualities that make our department successful.

ISO collects and evaluates information from communities in the United States on their structure fire suppression capabilities. The data is then analyzed, using the Fire Suppression Rating Schedule and then a Public Protection Classification grade is assigned to the community.

The schedule recognizes fire protection capabilities only related to the suppression of first alarm structural fires. ISO recognizes the dynamic and comprehensive duties of the fire service and understands the complex decisions a community must make in planning and delivering emergency services.

A communities' investment in fire mitigation is a proven and reliable predictor of future fire losses. The City of Hoover is committed to continually investing in emergency services for the protection of life and property in our community.



On March 8, 2022, we placed 2 new apparatus in service. The apparatus were manufactured by Sutphen; the first for our department. They were custom designed to allow for short wheel base, low hose bed and a tighter turning radius. These units were an economical option for custom fire engines. Engine 3 is located at Fire Station 3 in the Riverchase community and Engine 8 is located at Fire Station 8 in the Greystone community. Our fire engines typically serve 10 years as front line then placed into reserve status.

Monday, November 21, 2022, our department upgraded to new uniforms. These uniforms offer fire-resistant protection with Nomex material while giving a comfortable fit. They are a compliant NFPA 1975 uniform and provides a much safer apparel option for our personnel.



#### **Run Statistics**



# OPERATIONS DIVISION



### **Special Events**

#### **2022 Awards Ceremony**

On May 31, 2022 the department hosted the first Awards Ceremony since 2019 due to the impact of COVID-19. Due to this being the first ceremony that was able to be held in over 2 years, 89 members of the department were recognized. This include the promotion of 4 Division Chiefs, 13 District Captains, 18 Lieutenants, 22 Engineers, 3 Officer Development Classes, 2 Firefighters of the Year, 2 Paramedics of the Year, and 26 retirees.

### **Old Glory Relay**

On July 6, 2022 several members of the department participated in the World Games Old Glory Relay in which the American Flag was carried from Washington D.C. to Birmingham, Alabama over the course of 44 days. The Hoover Fire Department had the honor of carrying the flag over a section of Highway 31 to honor American Veterans.





### 2022 Patriot Day Ceremony and Memorial Stair Climb

On September 10, 2022 the Hoover Fire Department hosted the 2nd annual Patriot Day Ceremony and memorial Stair Climb to honor the men and women who lost their lives on 9/11. This event had 97 registered climbers and raised \$3,500 to benefit the Hoover Public Safety Foundation.







## OPERATIONS DIVISION



### **Special Operations**

#### **Technical Rescue**

The Hoover Fire Department Technical Rescue Team specializes in the disciplines of Vehicle and Machinery Extrication, Rope Rescue, Surface and Swift Water Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Trench Rescue, and Structural Collapse. In 2022, Technical Rescue 4 made 91 calls, the majority of which were Motor Vehicle Accidents requiring extrication and water related calls during severe weather events. Technical Rescue 4 also responded outside the city to assist other agencies during severe weather events. Also during 2022, the Technical Rescue Program received new water rescue related equipment which included a new inflatable rescue boat with new motor and trailer, and new PPE such as helmets, wetsuits, and personal flotation devices.

#### **Hazmat**

The Hoover Fire Department Hazmat Team made 13 Hazmat related calls in 2022. This team specializes in the mitigation of emergencies involving the release of Hazardous materials and in 2022, the team received 2 new Tango TX1 Carbon Monoxide monitors and 4 new Level A Hazmat suits.

#### **Peer Support Program**

The Hoover Fire Department is dedicated to ensuring that our members are not only physically healthy but also mentally healthy. With more information from numerous studies and experiencing stressful events in our own city, the focus on mental health is a priority. With this priority, the City of Hoover created a Behavioral Health Coordinator position in 2022. This position was filled by Reggie Parker MS, LPC, NCC who is a 28 year veteran of the Hoover Police Department. Under Mr. Parker's direction, HFD operates a Peer Support Team that is trained in responding to different events from a single bad incident to every day stressors of the job that cumulates over time. The team is made up from members of the department that attend specialized training in mental health and dealing with first responders. In August 2022, our members were requested to respond to Memphis, Tennessee to provide support for a line of duty death they experienced. Contact with more than 150 firefighters was made and follow ups are still being made with some of their members. The team is led by Captain Toby Rigsby who also serves as the Program Director for the Alabama Fire College Peer Support Program that serves all first responders in the state of Alabama.




The Hoover Fire Department was able to conduct several training programs in 2022. The department follows a monthly NFPA 1410 training outline that consist of all personnel completing structure fire related drills. Each of these drills allows each employee to receive a minimum of 192 hrs of fire ground related training. In addition to these prescribed drills, several other training programs were conducted.

#### Haz-Mat Refresher

Each member of the Hoover Fire Department received a minimum of 6hrs of Hazardous Materials training.





### **Truck Company Training**

During the month of February specialized Truck Company training was conducted at the Hoover Fire Training Center. All personnel assigned to ladder trucks trained on specific ground ladder and forcible entry training.



#### **Incident Management Training**

In March the command staff attended a 12hr incident management class. This training is designed to assist the incident commander with utilization and implementation of needed resources during an emergency that escalates in size.



### **Live Fire Training**

During the entire month of April all personnel attend Live Fire Training at the Hoover Fire Training Center. This training is "hands on" application of tactics utilized during a working structure fire.

### **New Apparatus Training**

Two new pumpers were delivered to Station 3 and Station 8. In-service training was conducted with all personnel assigned to these apparatus. Training consisted of proper vehicle checks, operation, driving, and pump operations.





#### **New Employee Training**

Each new employee attends a 3 day orientation that consist of classroom, station tours, and drill field evolution. This class is conducted a twice a year with an average class size of 8 new employees.





### **Health and Safety**

Each summer the entire department attend a health and safety training at the Hoover Fire Training Center. This training consist of reviewing accidents and injuries from the previous year with the intent of providing information in order to reduce these numbers. As part of health and safety our physical fitness program is reviewed and all personnel participate in a prescribed workout.

### **Hoover Fire Training Center**

Several improvements were made at the training center with the most notable being the addition of 4 conex boxes.





### **Physical Fitness Program**

The department was able to continue improving its physical fitness program with funds made possible through grant money. Additional equipment and rubber flooring were purchased for each station. Fox 6 featured the Hoover Fire Department Physical Fitness Program on the morning news and several firefighters participated in a daily workout that was aired live.





#### **State Certifications**

Hoover Fire hosted and instructed several state certification classes. The classes listed below were taught in Hoover by Hoover Fire Instructors and enabled not only Hoover Firefighters to receive certifications but firefighters across the state.

### EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES



The department responded to 7,632 EMS calls in calendar year 2022 and provided EMS standby for 159 events including large scale events such as SEC baseball tournament, Regions Charity Classic golf tournament and the 2022 World Games softball tournament. The department evolved into the primary EMS transport agency for the city of Hoover in April of 2021 and in calendar year 2022 transported 5,250 patients to area hospitals. Three new transport rescue units were purchased with an expected delivery in 2023 to replace aging units. The older rescue units will be placed in reserve status as back-up and special event units. The department along with our medical director physician continues to provide multiple in-house continuing education training classes each year for EMS providers and the department continues to teach multiple CPR/AED classes for city employees, school employees and the general public.









## EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES



All members of Hoover Fire Department and Hoover Police Department completed sensory training with Kulture City to better serve our population with varying needs and abilities. This training helped us to better understand how individuals with sensory needs view the world and how to engage them in a way to make the scene less overwhelming and make them as comfortable as possible. The training increased our ability to effectively communicate with these individuals and de-escalate situations as needed. Kulture City also provided us with sensory bags that include tools to help an individual who may be experiencing overwhelming sensory overload. We have already put this training and these tools to use multiple times as we respond to and care for our community.
